City Council Meeting Highlights from 9/22/25

The open council seat which is also up for election in November was filled by the swearing in of Jeff Artman. He

is only filling the seat until a new elected member can take it. He will not accept the seat beyond this term.

- Travis Bailey from Burns informed the governing body that the IdeaTek delays due to a court case will hopefully be decided by the end of October.
- "Jeep's Alley" was looked at by the city engineer and two options were presented to the council for how to deal with the flooding issues. Bids will be gathered to create more slope and designated water flow area. This will also address the crumbling concrete work at the south entrance of the alley.
- The council decided to raise the water rates effective January 1, 2026. The new rates will be a base increase of 5.25% and each additional unit (1,000gal) charge will be \$6.50. Current residential water rate is, \$24.70 + \$5.75 each additional unit. Looking towards the future and infrastructure needs the new residential rate in 2026 will be, \$26.00 base rate + \$6.50 each additional unit.
- Deputy's Report Be on alert for scammers, there has been an increase targeting the elderly, large amounts of money have been stolen. Also please do not leave your keys in your car, lock your homes and vehicles as there has also been in increase in stolen vehicles and robbery attempts.
- Animal Control Report Three dogs were out last Wednesday. The owners
 picked them up that evening and we did not have to hold them over night.
 They were not registered; upon registration they will not be fined.
- · Clerk's Report We have moved completely away from AT&T and now have Verizon for both internet and phones, this move saves the city over \$1,000 a month. Our Judge has officially changed our speeding fine formula.
- Maintenance Report The city was able to keep the extra chip seal rocks from the recent road repairs. We have plans to use this around the town as needed. Mayer completed their annual sewer cleaning on 1/3 of the town. Our water should return to normal now that El Dorado has completed their annual burn out.

APPLES! APPLES! APPLES!

National Apple Month (October) is the only national, generic apple promotion conducted in the United States. Originally founded in 1904 as National Apple Week, it was expanded in 1996 to a three-month promotional window from September through November.

Here are five fun facts about this fruit that is viewed as the second most valuable fruit grown in the United States (oranges are first).

- **1.** There are over 7,500 varieties of apples in the world and around 2,500 varieties grown in the United States. Apple orchards in the U.S. produce around 220,000,000 bushels per year!
- 2. The average person eats 65 apples a year. Apples are fat, sodium and cholesterol free – a medium apple averages 80 calories and has 5 grams of fiber.
- **3.** Archaeologists have found evidence that humans have enjoyed apples since at least 6,500 BC.
- 4. Apples can range in size from a little larger than a cherry to as large as a grapefruit.
- 5. To keep cut apples from browning. squeeze citrus juice directly onto the sliced apple OR soak for 30 seconds in a mixture of 2 tablespoons of honey and one cup water.

The Frederic Remington Historical Society The History of the Peabody, Kansas POW Camp

Marcia Sebree, President of the Peabody Historical Society will share information and events of the POW Camp in Peabody. The POW Camp #101 was opened as a tent camp south of Peabody in Sept 1943. The prisoners that would arrive were captured in Africa and were part of Rommel's Brigade. There was a great need for farm workers and were welcomed by many. All were not happy with this development. The camp was scheduled to end but the Peabody group applied for extended time. It was too cold to leave the camp out in tents so a new place would need to be approved. The Eyestone building in Peabody would fit the bill. The POW camp would remain until December of 1945. This was longer than most. There are many events and stories to share.
